The Mennonite Historical Society of BC was organized on 12 Dec 1972. Through its 45 year history the focus has shifted from the goal of developing a Museum depicting Mennonite life in Russia and western Canada and displaying a sizable collection of artifacts to developing and maintaining an environmentally-controlled Mennonite archive and research centre. The earlier idea of a Mennonite museum was supported by many of the older pioneers. Their intent was commendable – to establish for the coming generations a visible symbol of gratitude to God. Gradually a new vision emerged - a vision that attracted the imagination of another group of people keen to establish a Mennonite research centre.

Earliest attempts to salvage treasured Mennonite archival materials began at the Clearbrook Community Centre during the 1980s where some work was done to organize and record these materials. In 1986 an agreement was signed to transfer the files and other materials to Columbia Bible College. Subsequently, in 1987, the Mennonite Archival Association of BC was formed to oversee the development of the archives. Basement rooms at CBC were used for sorting and display from 1986 to 1991. In 1992, the Archives moved into excellent new facilities in the CBC Resource Centre and in 1994 the ownership of the Archives was transferred to the MHSBC. In 1997 the Society moved to Garden Park Tower.

In the fall of 2015, MHSBC relocated once again to the Mennonite Heritage Museum, where the Society has ample space for its research library, archival holdings, and volunteer activities.
