

## Letters of a Mennonite Couple, Nicolai and Katharina Rempel

Here is a rare collection of letters written during World War I by a Russian Mennonite couple separated for three and a half years by war and revolution. Tina cares for their three little daughters while living with her parents. Nicolai serves as a medic on an evacuation hospital train that carries the wounded from the front to receiving hospitals. He enters that service willingly, but his enthusiasm fades when he arrives at the theater of war and sees its wages: the smell of gunpowder, the roar of the cannon, the shattered bodies of dying soldiers, the struggles and suffering of families who are the innocent victims of this cataclysm. While later serving in Moscow, he welcomes the abdication of Tsar Nickolas II, and on May Day, 1917, he joins thousands to celebrate the New Revolution. Nicolai returns home late 1917 after the country had declined into civil chaos and the Bolsheviks have overthrown the Provisional Government.
